**Dear Members** 

This is the first Newsletter of 2024, and there's already plenty happening. The appointments of a new General Manager, and secretarial and Pro Shop support, welcome the way to the new season.

The course is looking remarkably good for this time of year, and there are plenty of events to report.

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### On the Course

- Although we have had closures and temporary greens over the winter, members hopefully can all see now the benefits of this, with the quality of the course for this time of year coming out of a bad winter.
- Since tree removal work was completed on the 7th green area the green itself has improved going through winter. This is as a result of more daylight

and increased air flow. We hope that next autumn/winter will be even better and we can go into next autumn with the greens and course in a much healthier condition.

- Our 6<sup>th</sup>, 7th and 18th greens have had a few bore holes installed to help them drain. We bored to 800 1000mm deep and already we have seen improvements. This is another measure to help us manage these greens over a longer period and within an agreed budget.
- Tree work is now complete for this winter. 10 of the 18 holes have had tree lower branches cut/lifted by our greens staff and a programme of tree felling has been undertaken by Whittakers as part of our joint forestry management. More light, more healthy growth.
- All tees which were turf cut have now been finished with new turf laid.
   There are a few other areas which will be completed on the next turf order.



- New hedging on the practice field has now been completed. This was all cost free as we qualified for a grant. All hedging is hawthorn with a mixture of Whitebeam and Rowan trees.
- We trust that flooding on the 14<sup>th</sup> fairway should be much less of a problem for some time as the farmer has ploughed his field.

He is considering creating a bund to the left of the 14th green to help alleviate flooding, as this is a condition of our agreement that the land we lease in this area remains fit for play. Although this is likely to be a constant

problem he has, especially given the extreme weather we can expect from climate change in the future.

#### **Ash Holt Floods**



- All bunkers have been edged off and those needing work to create easier entrancing and exiting have been completed; sand levels will be the next task for us to work at before the season starts.
- Sorrel rollers have been a great purchase as more aeration has been encouraged.
- All Greens staff attended a first aid course on the 21st of February, held in the club house along with a number of House and Office Staff.
- Our new fairway mower has started its move from the USA and we hope to see it in action by April, just as the grass starts growing vigorously.
- We will be purchasing a new tractor in April, as our old Kubota tractor has a major part broken at the rear. (Sounds like a Seniors complaint!) To repair this would be more than the tractor itself is worth. We are currently unable to lift any ancillary pieces of machinery with this and to try and do so could be a health and safety hazard.
- We are working through a programme of machinery servicing. Not surprisingly the cost of parts has increased quite a lot, and our machines have usage rates well above average, so the service bills are eye watering.
- 'Premier Pitches' returned in February to shockwave our greens again, which we have identified as a necessary part of course maintenance, to keep us on main greens during some of the adverse weather we experience.

 During February we worked with the JCB on our 5th hole green side bunkers, which now look very good. We also created a new practice green on the practice field, with one bunker and one grass hollow. We have also worked on paths, filling pot holes and adding white lines. The buggy compound has been cleared, and finished with a surface of motorway planings.



• The high quality of the course condition at present is very much due to maintenance work carried out over the past 12 months. The drainage and irrigation work, as well as the shockwaving and use of the sorrel roller, have all contributed to the quality of the course and where we are now with it. It should now take us into the new season in a much better prepared condition compared to our starting point this time last year. This all comes at a cost and the Greens staff and committee thank the club for ongoing support in providing a budget that is adequate, and is a big plus in developing and maintaining the quality of the course and playing experience for members and visitors.

### **Good Golfing Manners**

As we move towards a new season, it is a good time for some reminders of what good etiquette looks like on the course.

#### Quiet on the Tee

Our first tee is quite close to the clubhouse and the gathering area outside the shop, so remember that loud voices can carry easily and disturb those teeing off. Those with really loud voices probably need to keep this in mind almost everywhere on the course.

USGA says "Players should always show consideration for other players on the course and should not disturb their play by moving, talking or making any unnecessary noise."

### Pace of Play

Slow play is probably the most common complaint and no-one like to be waiting around for the group in front to get out of the way. Don't try and encourage them with a dangerous shot when they are still in range. If your match has a clear hole in front and you are delaying those behind, consider asking them if they want to play through.

Try and play quickly. Get to your ball and prepare your shot whilst others are playing, as long as you are not so far ahead as to be in their line of a wayward shot.


Be aware that smaller groups play faster and if you are 4 then a 3 behind might be waiting a lot, if you don't let them through. If you want to play as a 5 ball then this is only permitted if the course is quiet and you have cleared it with the Shop staff. If a 5 ball delays any other group they should split into 2 groups or let the others through immediately. 5 ball play is not usually permitted in competitions.

# Be a good greenskeeper

Our greens staff work hard to try and make sure we have a course to be proud of. We can all do our bit.

- Repair pitchmarks and other damage..
- Rake bunkers and remove stones.



- Replace divots and carry use divot bags to fill old divots.
- Use divot fill from boxes on tees
- Keep trollies and buggies away from greens and tees.
- Obey lines and ropes that limit access to damaged areas.
- Buggies keep to paths and semi rough, crossing fairways at 90 degrees

# **Members Meeting 15/2/24**

A good room full of members attended the open members meeting on 15 February and receive a presentation from Mike Mahony, Treasurer, of the background to the 2024 Subscription rates.

In a time of rapidly changing inflation rates, financial forecasting has been difficult and it is clear from comparisons with other similar clubs nearby that they have also experienced considerable challenges. The increases in headline subscription rates for all 7 of these clubs all exceeded those which Retford implemented last year, with all but 2 double or more. This suggests that Retford's 7% was more optimistic about a headline rate of inflation that eventually ran at 10% with costs of some major items, such a fertiliser, exceeding this by a long way.

Nevertheless. we continued to invest in the course and clubhouse, with improved bunkers, drainage to the 1st Green, irrigation, extended buggy compound, air conditioning in the bar, a new fleet of buggies to hire, greens equipment, washdown facilities etc.



Most recently a new practice shelter and mats have been put on the practice field with financial help from Nottinghamshire Golf Union and the Seniors and Juniors sections.





A new borehole planned for this year will reduce the size of our water bills and a long awaited and ordered new fairway mower is expected for delivery soon.

The result of this has been some depletion of our financial reserves and a need to restore some of the ground lost from a previously robust financial position.

Further comparison with the local 7 clubs shows that, even after the proposed 10% increase in our subscriptions we will still be charging our members less than all of them, and, given the general condition of our course and our record of managing to remain open much more than others in periods of bad weather, it suggests good value.

There is no complacency and members noted that our green fee rates are also pitched much lower than the others. Action has been taken to implement an immediate 15% increase in green fee charges which will be reviewed again when the impact of this increase on turnover has been assessed. On line booking for casual green fee payers is being introduced, aiming to put more visitors into the quiet times, and more active marketing and a branding upgrade are under consideration.

Finally, Members were assured that the Driving Range proposal would not be pursued in a way that would draw unreasonably on Club finances, nor incur significant financial risks to the Club. Members present generally indicated that they believed the proposed rise in subscriptions was appropriate.
