On the Fiddle

Like most Golf Clubs, we have a number of groups of members who organise themselves to play regular informal competitions. There is at least one on most days of the week throughout the year. These "fiddles" are happy to have new members join them.

One such group is the Midweek Fiddle (MWF) which organises competitions twice a week at present. It is a large group with over 50 members signed up for a £1 annual admin fee and regular attendance of between 20 and 30 for each event. They play a 3 or 4 ball AM-AM format with a £2 entry fee which is divided between the winners with a proportion reserved for a charity donation at the end of the year.

On a Monday, members of MWF wishing to play are put into a draw and one member from each match makes a reservation on the tee booking system for their match, usually between 10 and 11 AM. On Wednesdays MWF have a "roll up slot" reserved for any member who wants to play from 10.00am. Fiddlers attend the clubhouse to enter a draw at 9.40am on the day with no advance booking needed.

The MWF also organises trips away to stay and play at other courses and an annual Christmas dinner with prizes awarded for performances through the year.

MWF has a wide range of handicaps from 1 to 30 and everyone is welcome. The AM-AM teams are drawn in a way that seeks to ensure a range of handicaps in each team and they play off yellow tees. Anyone new to the MWF can join by rolling up on a Wednesday and making themselves known. Also Craig is usually happy to make any necessary introduction.

Of course many other Fiddle options are available in different sizes and formats. If you would like to let more members know about a fiddle you enjoy, then the Communications Group would be happy to help you publicise it.

Ladies' Roll-Up

The Ladies also have time allocated for their Roll-ups. Potentially 17 ladies can play on a Monday morning and 30 on a Friday morning.

So far the allocated tee times have been used efficiently but if the organisers have advanced knowledge that some ladies cannot play, they inform Craig so that he can release the tee times to the Booking System. The format played is normally a 4 ball competition with 2 to score. Each lady pays 50p so that the winners can receive £1 and the runners up 50p. Any surplus goes into the Charity box. As always, anyone wishing to join the roll-up is very welcome.

Rare Bird Sighted

Buzzards, Crows and Starlings are common on our course, but recently we had a very rare sighting of an Albatross which wandered on to the 10th hole. I expect you know that this represents a score of 3 under par, or a 2 on this par 5.

The author of this achievement was not, as might have been expected, the long driving Andrew Cooke, but his elderly father, Charles, who said "In 53 years of golf I have had 3 holes in one but this is the only Albatross I have ever seen".

Charles, (now known as "The Ancient Mariner"), described his triumph modestly. "A well struck drive was followed by a 3 wood which I thought had gone in the green side bunker, but despite a multiplayer search the ball could not be found. No-one thought to look in the hole, but there it was. With a handicap shot, that made 6 stableford points!"

On the Course

Course Update

- 1. Construction and development work; a JCB was used on the 6th medal tee, and stripping the 11th medal tee, which will give more teeing area. The 5th fairway bunker has been re-instated, to remove excess stones and define the edges.
- 2. Because of very little grass cover and growth, a number of tees have been stripped and have been re-turfed.
- 3. The planning and installation of the new wash down bay in the Greenkeepers' compound is under way, to meet efficiency and H&S standards.
- 4. Tree work on a number of holes has been largely completed. You'll see a major improvement on the 3rd, 4th, 8th, 12th, 13th and 17th. A large clear up after the February storms has also had to be done.
- 5. Leaf clearance is now about complete but leaf and wood debris accumulation will be monitored to ensure a final sweep is completed.
- 6. A new waste bin has been installed at the 7^{th} tee; 2 other bins have been refurbished and will be put out onto the course.
- 8. We are regularly monitoring the posts and ropes and keep repositioning them to avoid excess wear and tear around them; this is ongoing.
- 9. Our programme for servicing of machinery has now begun, starting off with the greens mower; the rest of the machinery will be serviced in line with our plan.

Current Planned work

February/March

- 1. All stripped areas to be turfed
- 2. New bunkers to be filled with sand

- 3. Remaining bunkers to be edged off and sand added where needed.
- 4. Micro-tine greens

5 Tee yardage markers to be cleaned and reinstalled onto tees; this should make them more visible

6. Continuation of tree work for tree maintenance

Max Wood (from the greens staff) is currently off work and we wish him a speedy recovery. This has meant the greens staff have been down to 4, and we're very grateful to them all for the great job in covering and keeping the programme up to speed.

Use of the 7th temporary green.

In answer to a query from a member, the Management Committee agreed that the 7th temporary green will not be used in the future. It has proven over a couple of years difficult to develop the area and the time and money given to this was not cost effective. Temporary greens are just that - 'temporary'. The greens staff use them, after inspections of the course and greens justify their use, to prevent any longer-term damage to the key areas of the greens and course.

Golf Tips from James Freeman

"Strong Winds"

If you have been playing in strong winds, spend some time between games resetting your fundamentals – for example, grip, aim, stance, posture, ball position, and swinging in balance.

We all make subtle adjustments, sometimes sub-consciously, to allow for the wind, so from time to time we all need a reset.

<u>Juniors</u>

Saturday morning coaching sessions continue for Juniors, with James Freeman. There will be a Retford team entered into the Notts Juniors

competitions, and a friendly match has been arranged against Rufford on Sunday 3rd April. More events are planned for later in the year.
